A strong ethical culture helps ensure that employees comply with all applicable rules and regulations. In a strong ethical culture, employees feel safe to report suspicious or fraudulent activities without fear of retaliation. An effective whistleblowing policy can help detect and address fraud more quickly. A strong ethical culture helps build trust between employees, management, and other stakeholders. This trust is essential to creating a harmonious and productive work environment. Organizations that are known to have a strong ethical culture will be more appreciated by customers, investors, and business partners. This good reputation can provide long-term benefits for the organization. Thus, building and maintaining an ethical culture in an organization is an important step in fraud prevention. This not only helps reduce the risk of fraud, but also increases transparency, compliance, and trust in the organization (Susanto, H. (2024).

Challenges in Implementing Forensic Accounting
